LITERATURE and LANGUAGE

What type of literature is revelation and how does this impact our understanding of the language of Revelation?

Epistles, Prophecy, Apocalypse

The revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave him to show to his servants the things that must soon take place. He made it known by sending his angel to his servant John,

Revelation 1:1-4 (ESV)

Who bore witness to the word of God and to the testimony of Jesus Christ, even to all that he saw. Blessed is the one who reads aloud the words of this prophecy, and blessed are those who hear,

STRUCTURE and SEQUENCE

Sequential, Consecutively, Repetitive, Recapitulative?

Then I saw an angel coming down form heaven, holding in his hand the key to the bottomless pit and a great chain. And he seized the dragon, that ancient serpent, who is the devil and Satan, and bound him

- While the dominant eschatological view of the church has been amillennialism, other views have flourished at different times, mainly in reaction to cultural developments.
- Eschatology is not a monolithic entity in the church.

- Whatever your view might be, you can probably find someone in church history who has the same view.
- You also have others in our church who have a different view, which should encourage kindness and humility when talking about all this.

Interpretive Schools Of Revelation

- Preterist: 1st-century fulfillment with the fall of Jerusalem
- Historical: fulfilled throughout history from 1st to 2nd coming
- Futurist: fulfilled in the future
- Idealist: fulfilled in time from 1st to 2nd coming

MILLENNIAL SCHOOLS

- Pre-Millennial: Historical and Dispensational
- Post Millennial
- Amillennial

My Approach

- Language: apocalyptic literature primary with symbolic language
- Structure: repeating and recapitulating visions describing the time from the 1st to 2nd coming
- Time: metaphors and images relevant to the original 1st century audience, but convey relevant truth for all times

A letter of prophecy written to the 1st century church in apocalyptic images that describes the time from the first to second coming of Jesus in repeating visions

7 Reasons I take an amillennial view


- Uses Revelation itself as the interpretive key
- Employs Jesus as the hermeneutic key, not Israel
- Follows how the NT writers understood the OT
- Matches the teaching of discipleship and mission of the rest of the NT

7 Reasons I take an amillennial view

- Keeps the work of Christ and the importance of the church preeminent
- Does not tie Revelation to speculation for fulfillment
- Matches the teaching of the second coming of Christ found in the NT
